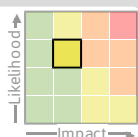

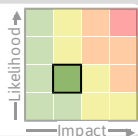

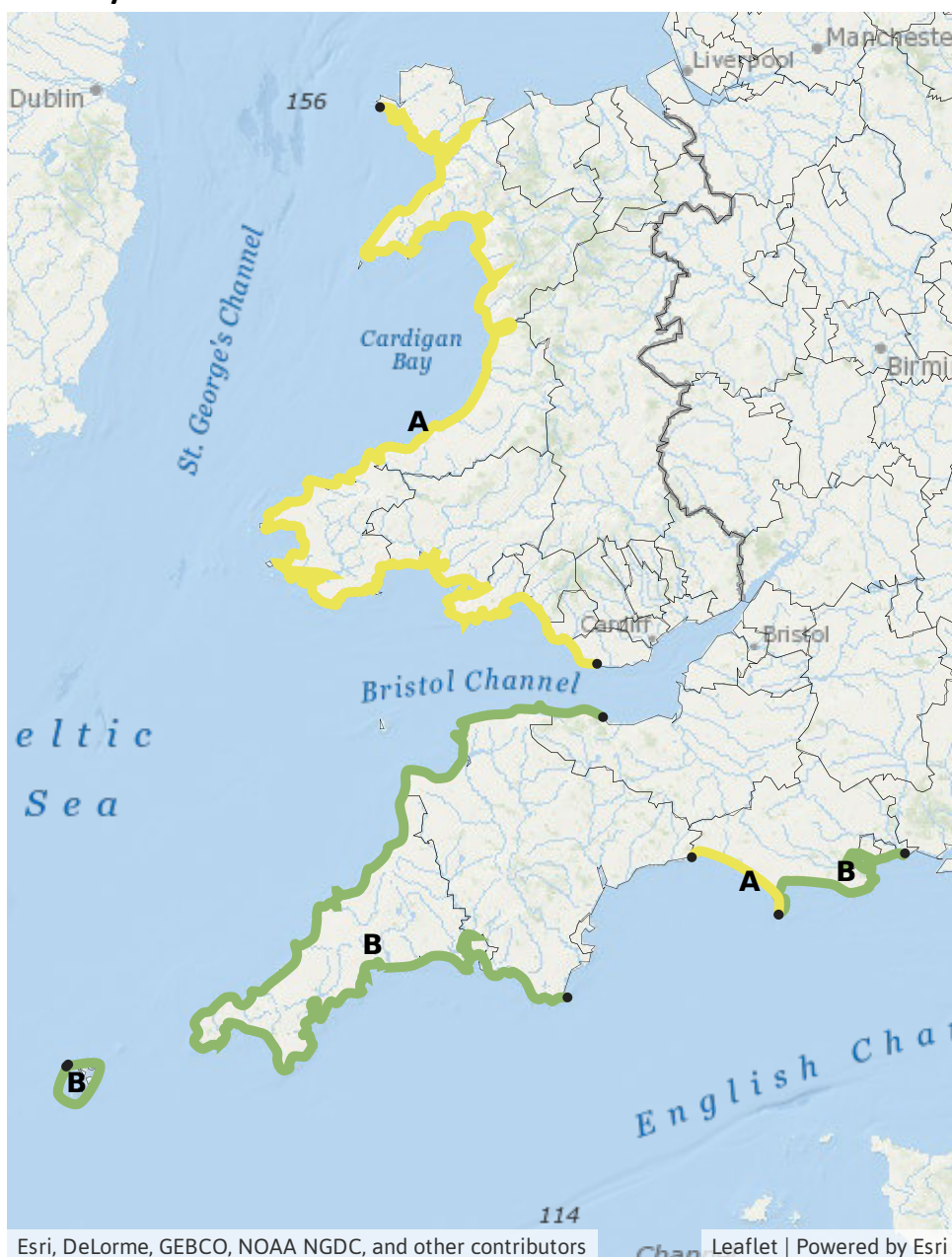

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Assessment of flood risk



Coastal/Tidal

The coastal/tidal flood risk is LOW for parts of Wales and the Dorset Coast today (Monday). Today, a deep area of low pressure associated with ex-hurricane Ophelia brings strong winds, large surge and very large waves to the south and west coasts of England and Wales. Local minor coastal flood impacts are probable along coastlines labelled A, and possible along coastlines labelled B on the Specific Areas of Concern Map 1. Spray and wave overtopping of coastal defences could lead to public safety concerns.

Local minor coastal flood impacts are possible but not expected around the south and west coasts of England and Wales later on Thursday and during Friday, when a period of unsettled weather is likely to spread in from the west and coincide with spring tides.



Rivers

Heavy rain is possible in the south of England and Wales on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Any impacts are expected to be minimal and so the river flood risk remains VERY LOW for the next five days.



Surface water

Heavy rain is possible in the south of England and Wales on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Any impacts are expected to be minimal and so the surface water flood risk remains VERY LOW for the next five days.



Groundwater

The groundwater flood risk is VERY LOW for the next five days.

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6-10 day forecast

A spell of unsettled weather continues to have the potential to coincide with spring tides at the end of the week (including Saturday 21 October). This brings a possibility of heightened flood risk for the south and west coasts of England and Wales.

Summary of potential impacts

MINIMAL

Isolated and minor flooding of low-lying land and roads
Isolated spray/wave on coastal promenades
Little or no disruption to travel, but wet road surfaces

MINOR

Localised flooding of land and roads
Flooding affecting individual properties
Disruption to travel and key sites in flood plans

SIGNIFICANT

Flooding affecting parts of communities
Possible danger to life and damage to buildings/structures
Disruption to travel and key sites in flood plans

SEVERE

Danger to life, severe disruption to travel
Widespread flooding affecting whole communities
Widespread disruption or loss of infrastructure
Large scale evacuation of properties possible
